

Maureen Brathwaite, international solo soprano, and new talent from the soul & gospel tradition

Saturday 1st November, 7.30pm at Manchester Cathedral

In 2006, Jessie James, aged 15, was gunned down in Manchester's inner city. His mother asked why the churches were not doing something to save the lives of these young sons.

Three years prior to this agonised cry something was beginning in secret, hidden from view. We believe that this project may be the beginning of a response to the anguish of the mothers who have lost their sons in this way. The Gospel Requiem project: 'Don't take a life: Getta life' was born from a spiritual experience within prayer. It is fronted by an emerging Anglican based Order: 'The Sisters of Jesus.' Money has been found to finance this work to begin a project to make a difference. It is looking for people of good-will who together can begin to change things. The journey of a thousand miles begins with one step.

This project aims to offer the gift of skill: a skill worth having: a way to 'getta life': to win "respect". We already have matched funding for two bursary places for three years at Junior RNCM ... for young people of talent in any one of the following: keyboard, percussion-drums, voice, brass and woodwind.

We are looking to raise funds for a third place. Donations will also go to provide extra tuition to bring young people up to audition standard and provide travel and equipment grants for apprenticeship places.

We need: Apprenticeship places that will be personally supervised and mentored so that they can hold their head up high in the street: young people will then have a skill worth having and some money in their pocket. We are looking for places in:

- · Roadie positions with concert and rock/performance P/A systems
- · Cabinet making
- · Musical instrument and repair work.
- · Stage hands
- · Silversmithing
- · Technical drawing (architecture)

Can you offer a place, a new skill that can make a difference?

Maureen Brathwaite Solo soprano in opera and classical repertoire. Maureen has studied at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, where she won the Capital Radio Anna Instone memorial Award and the Ian Fleming Award. One of her goals is to incorporate singing talent into the education system within the schools to engage with young people through the arts: singing, dancing, writing songs. Currently at work on an arts, music and media-focused degree at Salford University, she aims to link her performance and wider studies into a unique whole. She is presently working with disadvantaged youngsters on a regular weekly basis. Her support for this event is part of her commitment to make a difference to youngsters who can be empowered through the joy of making music.

He has performed in Prisons, schools, concerts, and churches inspiring young people with his positive message. The Junior RNCM provides specialist training to musically gifted youngsters between the ages of 8 and 18. Juniors attend on Saturdays outside normal school hours, travelling from as far as Cumbria and Cleveland, North Yorkshire, Nottinghamshire and Shropshire. Many Juniors are members of the National Youth Orchestra, the National Children's Orchestra or the National Youth Wind Orchestra and several have achieved notable success in festivals and music competitions, both locally and nationally.
